Which RV should I choose?

RV Classes: Class A

Length: 26 to 45 ft

Weight: 13,000 to 30,000 lbs

Capacity: 1-4 people

Pros: more luxurious, true home on wheels, more space/amenities

Cons: more expensive to buy/maintain, parking limitations, special license







Avg cost: \$100K - \$300K+

RV Classes: Class B

Length: 17 to 23 ft


Weight: 4,000 to 9,000 lbs

Capacity: 1-2 people

Pros: more travel freedom, easy parking, more fuel efficient

Cons: less storage, small living space, fewer amenities







Avg cost: \$80K - \$180K

RV Classes: Class C

Length: 20 to 30 ft


Weight: 10,000 to 13,000 lbs

Capacity: 1-4 people

Pros: less expensive, easy to maneuver, standard amenities, space over cab

Cons: less space than Class A, still costly to maintain, possible size limitations







Avg cost: \$50K - \$150K

RV Classes: Travel Trailer

Length: 10 to 40 ft

Weight: 1,100 to 12,000 lbs


Capacity: 1-6 people

Pros: unhitch & leave, more affordable, no engine maintenance

Cons: more difficult to reverse/park, unstable high winds, weight distribution







Avg cost: \$10K - \$100K

RV Classes: Fifth Wheel

Length: 22 to 40 ft

Weight: 7,000 to 20,000 lbs

Capacity: 1-6 people

Pros: most stable towable RV, most storage space, multiple bedrooms

Cons: vehicle limitations, length/height restrictions, less fuel efficient (weight)








Avg cost: \$35K - \$150K

RV Option: Toy Hauler







RV Classes: Pop Up Trailer

Length: 8 to 16 ft


Weight: 700 to 4,000 lbs

Capacity: 1-2 people

Pros: lightweight, easy towing/storage, very affordable

Cons: no insulation, less storage/amenities, lower cargo capacity







Avg cost: \$2K - \$20K

RV Classes: Camper Truck

Length: a few ft longer than truck

Weight: 1,000 to 3,600 lbs Unloaded Vehicle Weight (UVW)

Capacity: 1-2 people

Pros: "off the grid" travel, 4WD + powerful suspension, easy parking

Cons: limited storage/amenities, not compatible for families







Avg cost: \$5K - \$60K

RV Classes: Bus Conversion

Length: variable

Weight: variable

Capacity: 1-6 people

Pros: customized to your needs, can be cheaper DIY, typically larger

Cons: campground limitations, mechanic limitations, time consuming







Avg cost: \$10K - \$70K

RV Features: Slides vs No Slides

Pros: more space, adds windows, unit size considerations

Cons: mechanical issues, more weight, balance considerations





RV Features: Slides vs No Slides

Slide In Slide Out





RV Features: Length Considerations

Pros: more space and amenities

Cons: driving/parking difficulties, park entry limitations





Is an RV more cost effective?

Cost Considerations

Type of RV

- Varies based on manufacturer, year, model, length, overall condition
- What are the current market trends

Loan payment, interest rates, and insurance

- Longer loan / higher down payment = lower monthly payment / interest rate
- Current interest market: 7-8%

Rent

- Campground/parking fees
- Utilities

Cost Considerations

Maintenance

- Warranty coverage?

Vehicle

- Truck for travel trailer
- Towable vehicles
 - Manual transmission or transfer case
 - Jeep Wrangler (1997-2023)
 - Chevrolet Equinox (2010-2023)
 - Honda CRV (2007-2014)





Extra Costs

Flat tow package (\$4000+)

Towing dollies (\$500 - \$1000)

Brake control (\$200)

Flatbed trailers (\$4000+)

Sewage hoses (\$40 - \$50)

Pressure regulator (\$10 - \$20)

Extra storage (\$2000)

Wifi or cell signal booster (\$500)

Bicycle or kayak rack (~\$100)

Ladder (~\$200)







Winter Living

Heated underbelly

Furnace or electric add on

Heat tape for water line

Electric heater must not exceed line input

Dehumidifier

Moisture builds up under mattress

Sleep with window open


Water pump - is it safe from cold air?


Towing: Weight Considerations

Safety Considerations

Brake controller for 5th wheel or travel trailer

Pressure regulator on water line

New tires - check date code before buying any RV

RV tire treads rarely wear out before they should be replaced (6-10 years)


Pay attention to vehicle height clearance

UV damage to roof and tires

Awareness of theft (bicycles)

Weighing your options:


Housing or contract 1st?
